## KIDZ@WORK online!



NEWS launched its new campaign website KIDZ@WORK on Friday, 5<sup>th</sup> of May. Just in time for World Fair Trade day 2006.

The new website is part of the ongoing campaign against exploitative child labour and for Fair Trade. KIDZ@WORK is a fun place for kids to learn, ask questions, be creative and to understand how they too can be actors for change in their own family and schools.

For the first time, there is a website for children in 8 languages: Danish, Dutch, English, German, Italian, Portuguese, Spanish and Swedish. Children can get in contact with and share their opinions with other children from their country or with children elsewhere in Europe.

KIDZ@WORK offers downloads, fun one-click games and lots of information about child labour, football and Fair Trade.

Within the first ten days we had more than 3.000 visitors not only from Europe but from all over the world: from Australia, Brazil, Peru, Argentina, Mexico and even from the Seychelles.

## Fair Trade in Spain

Like Spain itself, its Fair Trade movement is truly diverse: different organisations from different sectors – ranging from the peace movement to the economic solidarity movement, not forgetting the environmentalists and ecologists- all have a stake in the Spanish Fair Trade movement. This diversity is reflected in the activities organised by the "Coordinadora Estatal de Comercio Justo", the Spanish Fair Trade Forum.

After successful World Fair Trade Day activities across Spain the season continues with the famous Fair Trade fiesta – this time it will be be bigger than ever, aiming to top the 70,000 visitors in 2005.

The annual Fair Trade Party first took place in 2000 as part of the celebrations to welcome the Finnish Fair Trade Ship "Estelle" which docked in Barcelona's port for two weeks in May 2000. Whilst the ship was docked in Barcelona's port, 20 000 people attended Fair Trade exhibitions, concerts, talks and parties on the ship. Such was the success of this event in 2000 that the organisers decided to stage the event again year after year – with more events registered across Cataluña each year. The Fair Trade Party is very much a joint effort between many Spanish organisations, coordinated by SETEM. More and more organisations are getting involved, in order to reach more people and to raise awareness amongst Catalan citizens about trade relationships between North and South, about Fair Trade and Responsible Consumption. The Fair Trade Party has become the most important event in Catalonias "solidarity" calendar of events, the idea has spread to other parts of Spain - this year will see the first events organised outside of Catalonia.

#### Fair Trade with all senses

Sea of Chocolate, City of Rice, Wheel of Fussili and Coloured Snails are just some of the fantastic fair creations that Spanish kids can come up with during their fair trade cooking workshops. Begonya's favourite is The Red-Haired Lady of Quinoa:

The main ingredient is Fair Trade Quinoa - just cook it in boiling water with salt. Afterwards put it on the plate making the form of the face and neck of the woman. Add grated carrot for the woman's read hair and olives, pea and red pepper for the eyes, necklace and lips.



Children in the Madrid area can learn a little about fair trade whilst learning how to cook easy dishes with fair trade ingredients in a fun and creative way. The children can come up with their own creations and choose what they want to make. All the classes have been fully booked with long waiting lists! Using all senses children come into contact with Fair Trade – we look forward to the cook book!!

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#### Fair Trade at Home

An exhibition in Madrid at the beginning of June demonstrates how the conscious consumers can go all the way with the Fair Trade Home. A house furnished and decorated with only Fair Trade furniture and crafts will be on display to show how it is possible. The exhibition shows Fair Trade is constantly improving quality and design.



Most of the furniture comes from Honduras and is imported by COPEDA – a Spanish Fair Trade organisation. COPEDA's furniture is the first Fair Trade furniture to be certified by the Forest Stewardship Council. The project partners in Honduras are constructing several technical training centres for artisans of the region with the money from Fair Trade sales. ## New IDEAS – Fair Procurement in Spain

This spring, Spanish NGO IDEAS (member of the Coordinadora Comercio Justo) launched a project on the introduction of ethical and ecological public procurement in the Andalucían Ministry of Environment. Throughout the year the project will focus on food, textiles, office material, office furniture, cleaning products, paper and derivatives. IDEAS has developed a joint strategy with Spanish NGO Bakeaz in order to introduce ethical and environmental criteria.

The first phase of the initiative involves a diagnosis based on the purchasing process of seven products: cleaning products and services, office material, office furniture, food, textiles, computers and paper. IDEAS organized a informative seminar with the 40 key agents of

the procurement process from the Environmental Ministry and the regional government. The seminar was very useful for agents to gain an understanding the concept of ethical and sustainable public procurement, the concept of Fair Trade and the legal possibilities of integrating social and ethical considerations. It is hoped that this pilot project extend to include further Departments next – it might even set the ball rolling for fair procurement projects in other Spanish autonomies. "Now, we would like to make efforts to unite the Fair Trade Shops in order to made Fair Trade in Japan successful!", said Naho Murakami.

#### Advocacy

At a European Parliament public hearing on Fair Trade and Development on 25th April 2006, the success of Fair Trade in the South as one of the best examples of sustainable development and poverty reduction was acknowledged by MEPs (Members of European Parliament). International representatives from the Fair Trade movement were present to report on the benefits for producers and the astounding growth in Fair Trade markets in the Northern Hemisphere – and perhaps more importantly to remind MEPs that the EU has committed itself to supporting and promoting Fair Trade.

Yet Members of the European Parliament (MEPs) announced that more efforts are needed to get the system working better in order to increase consumer confidence in the Fair Trade system, according to Green MEP Frithjof Schmidt, who drafted a Report of Fair Trade and Development in order for the EU to advance Fair Trade, it

must focus on consumer protection, raising awareness, increasing environmental standards and transparency. Not surprisingly, the report also called for clear standards to be set. At the moment, such legal Fair Trade standards have been introduced in France, with negotiations in Italy and Belgium currently taking place.
