On the first Tuesday, after a quarter of Plain Bob Royal for VE day 80, we rang, much to Barry Peachey's surprise, a course of Double Bob Major!

And the WoW group meeting on Friday 9th followed a substantial Plain Bob Major session for one rusty ringer with Oxford Treble Bob Minor and variants.

Congratulations to Sam Austin on ringing a peal of Bristol Surprise Royal in hand.

On Tuesday 13th, a practice quarter of Plain Bob Major was despatched in the absence of Chris (M) and Heather, and was followed by Plain Courses of St. Clement's C.B. Little Bob, Double Bob and Gainsborough Little Bob.

Two sessions were run in parallel on Friday 16th at Market Weighton. A quarter of Bob Minor on Jim's light 6 was followed by a head banging session of Single Oxford Bob, Double Bob and Reverse Bob.

It is interesting to note that Little Bob Major and Royal have become more prominent in our ringing. Little Bob is more challenging than Kent TB on these numbers; there's a lot of work to deal with, and spotting the half lead early enough can be a big challenge every 8 changes.

The Stedman Triples project continues to progress with a weekly online meeting, and a monthly physical meeting. We met in Knaresborough on Thursday 29th with Timothy, Sue, Elaine, and Peters S and C, we were made most welcome, again, by John Leech.

We also took the opportunity to review arrangements for the YACR Handbells day set for the Saturday (31st). Registration for 31st had closed on 19th and the 23 ringers arranged into 4 parallel streams, hopefully to give everyone their first choice of challenge whilst helping lesser experienced ringers to progress.

However, before that day could take place we met at Karen's school and rang a good quarter peal of Plain Bob Major which was Karen's 500th quarter and also a birthday compliment to her.

The day started with tutorial sessions addressing methods beyond Plain Bob, and Conducting, as well as a beginners session.

Jocasta Perry was the star of the beginners managing to ring all three pairs to Plain Courses of Plain Bob Minor before the end of the day.

The conducting workshop went very well with at least one "lightbulb" moment for Sue as well as engagement with the challenge by Karen and Timothy, and some excellent supportive comments by Jain Scott.

Other workshops covered Treble dodging Minor, much Double Norwich, and some Surprise Major.

The lunch break saw an unscheduled Stedman Triples session.

Many thanks to Elaine and John for their work in planning the day, for Karen for hosting the day (the school is perfect for a handbells day), and to Neil Donovan and Sam Austin for running workshops at short notice.

Food for Thought

Oxford Treble Bob is a lovely method for the ringer, a little less so for the conductor. However, Oxford TB Minor also leads to 2 closely related methods, Sandal TB (Oxford with 5ths at the Half Lead) and Duke of Norfolk TB (Sandal with 2nds at the Lead End).

Sandal then leads to a couple of interesting Delight methods, Neasden Delight (Sandal with 4ths when Treble passes through 2-3), and 2nds place Neasden which is called Old Oxford Delight.

Old Oxford Delight and Neasden Delight have the same work above the treble as Westminster Group Surprise methods and Norwich Group Surprise methods respectively.

So, stepping stones to Norwich Surprise:

- Oxford Treble Bob
- Sandal Treble Bob
- Neasden Delight
- Norwich Surprise

So, stepping stones to Westminster Surprise:

- Oxford Treble Bob
- Duke of Norfolk Treble Bob
- Old Oxford Delight
- Westminster Surprise
